



### **LOUISIANA ADVOCACY CORPS**

The Louisiana Advocacy Corps, an initiative of Louisiana CASA, is an AmeriCorps VISTA member program with VISTA members serving in CASA programs and other child-serving agencies. VISTA members serve with a local CASA program, implementing programs and creating best practices to increase volunteer retention, raise awareness of child abuse and neglect prevention and education programs, and increase educational advocacy for children in care. In 2018 there were 36 dedicated VISTA members making up the Louisiana Advocacy Corps. In addition to their service with their assigned location, the Advocacy Corps meets bimonthly to perform a community service project at various locations in Louisiana. In addition, the Louisiana Advocacy Corps hosted a summer associate program in 2018 with VISTA members providing direct service to clients.
